



Safety Corner

Back Safety

Back injuries account for nearly half of the injuries reported each year. It is important that you practice proper lifting and bending to prevent an injury from occurring. Please go over these simple steps to help prevent future injuries.

How to Prevent Back Injuries

The best way to prevent back injuries is to develop habits that reduce the strain placed on the back. There are some basic things you can do to help.

1. Avoid Lifting and Bending Whenever You Can

Anytime you can spare your back the stress and strain of lifting and bending, do so! If you don't use your back like a lever, you avoid putting it under so much potentially damaging force.

Place objects up off the floor. If you can set something down on a table or other elevated surface instead of on the floor, do it so you won't have to reach down to pick it up again.

Raise / lower shelves. The best zone for lifting is between your shoulders and your waist. Put heavier objects on shelves at waist level, lighter objects on lower or higher shelves.

Use carts and dollies to move objects, instead of carrying them yourself.

2. Use Proper Lifting Procedures

You can't always avoid lifting, but there are ways to reduce the amount of pressure placed on the back when you do so. By bending the knees, you keep your spine in a better alignment, and you essentially take away the strain on your back. Instead of using your back like a crane, you allow your legs to do the work.

Follow these steps when lifting:

1. Take a balanced stance with your feet about a shoulder-width apart. One foot can be behind the object and the other next to it.
2. Squat down to lift the object, but keep your heels off the floor. Get as close to the object as you can.
3. Use your palms (not just your fingers) to get a secure grip on the load. Make sure you'll be able to maintain a hold on the object without switching your grip later.
4. Lift gradually (without jerking) using your leg, abdominal and buttock muscles and keeping the load as close to you as possible. Keep your chin tucked in so as to keep a relatively straight back and neck line.
5. Once you're standing, change directions by pointing your feet in the direction you want to go and turning your whole body. Avoid twisting at your waist while carrying a load.
6. When you put a load down, use these same guidelines in reverse.

Also follow these lifting tips:

Reduce the amount of weight lifted. If you're moving a bunch of books, better to load several small boxes than one extremely heavy load.

Use handles and lifting straps.

Get help if the shape is too awkward or the object is too heavy for you to lift and move by yourself!

RENEWING YOUR MERCHANT MARINE DOCUMENTS / U.S. COAST GUARD LICENSES

Not all professions are as closely regulated as the maritime industry. Holding a license or merchant marine document (MMD), proves that you possess the skills and experience required to be part of a team that can operate vessels.

Having a current license is probably one of the most important ways to further your marine career.

For each mariner, keeping documents up-to-date is a condition of employment and your personal responsibility.

The process of renewing your documents is not complicated, but it does include several steps that must be accurately completed. Whether you are obtaining your license or MMD for the first time, or upgrading your current license / MMD, you must provide quite a bit of information to the USCG. It is imperative that you provide evidence that all necessary qualifications have been met before a license or MMD can be renewed. The U.S. Coast Guard will not begin to process an application until the applicant has submitted a complete package. To find what is required to apply for an original or renewal of a license, you can go to the U.S. Coast Guard website www.uscg.mil/nmc or you may call them to request a package at 1-888-427-5662 (select option #3).

If you need assistance in applying for an original license, or renewing your current license, there are several agencies who provide this service. This is not the responsibility of your employer to apply for your license / renewal; it is your responsibility. Although there are many sources to help you with applying for your license, below are the names and contact information of a few:

Licenses and MMDs are only valid for five years. However, mariners have a grace period when applying for renewal. The renewal process may begin up to 12 months before it expires. After the current document expires, you are given a 12 month grace period to renew it, but once your credential has expired, the credential is then invalid until your new credential arrives and is in your hands. Allowing your required license to expire could be devastating to your career and can lead up to many disciplinary actions; up to and including termination, therefore we HIGHLY suggest starting your renewal process as early as possible.

MEDICAL CERTIFICATES / WAIVERS

The medical certificate is a new document that serves as proof that each mariner meets the required medical and physical standards, per the publication of the Federal Register (FR). All medical certificates are to be kept with your license. If you are issued a medical waiver, once again, it is to be kept with your license. Also, it is your responsibility to abide by this waiver. If you do not abide by any medical waiver issued to you by the U.S. Coast Guard, this may cause your license to be deemed as invalid.

Regarding Your 2014 Tax Return

As we move into 2015, we would like to share some information about the reporting of health coverage, which will be important for your 2014 tax returns.

Employees must report they had coverage in effect during 2014

Beginning with tax reporting year 2014, tax filers must report to the IRS if they, their spouses and dependents had health coverage. To help you, Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Louisiana has proactively produced a statement of 2014 coverage for members. We think this information will be useful when preparing your 2014 taxes.

Statement of Coverage

Any employee with fewer than 12 months of coverage in 2014 will be mailed a statement of coverage. All other employees may access their 2014 coverage statement by logging into their online account at www.bcbsla.com. Statements will be available by Feb. 15, 2015, and can be found under the "Statements" tab. Employees may also call the Customer Service number on the back of your ID card.

New rules for tax reporting year 2015

Beginning with tax reporting year 2015, health insurance issuers and certain employers will be required to send specific IRS forms to covered individuals to assist with the filing of their tax returns.



2014/2015 Health Plan Announcement

In keeping our goal of offering a rich and well-rounded benefit package at a low cost to you, we are continually monitoring our programs, especially the medical benefits. In our efforts to maintain the affordability of our medical plan, two areas of concern still persist that require some immediate attention:

1) Prescription Drug (Rx) Program – Our drug costs rose 16.5% last year and are increasing at a rate of 17.9% this year. We are seeing a positive change with the copay adjustments we made on July 1, 2014 with employees using more Generic drugs and Therapeutic Generic Alternatives. We need to continue the momentum of this change and request generics whenever possible. Remember to discuss the available generic drug options with your physician and your pharmacist. Effective April 1, 2015, we are making the following changes to the PX Program:

2) Obesity Surgery – With the positive results we have seen so far, at this time, we are going to continue to cover some surgical procedures to treat morbid obesity, but not all of them. There is limited research data available and it appears that the Gastric Bypass procedure delivers the quickest weight loss; however, it also seems to have the highest complication and mortality rates. With this in consideration, beginning April 1, 2015, we will no longer cover the Gastric Bypass procedure. However, please note that you will still have the ability to treat morbid obesity through other surgical procedures such as the gastric band and gastric sleeve. Our goal with this change is to limit unnecessary risks. Remember that only employees are eligible for this benefit and must meet requirements specified under the Plan prior to being approved for any surgical procedure.

Please know that our drive in making these changes effective April 1, 2015 is for the well-being of our employees and their dependents as well as for our health plan and to retain the ability to sponsor the plan well into the future.

Calico Beans
